All homes have a foundation, and ours is a core of approximately 75 volunteers whose support has remained steady, even during the all-toorecent pandemic. During a time when, nationally, volunteer numbers are in decline, we are building back the support of new volunteers, essentially rebuilding the framework that helps support our organization.

In 2022, 48 teams joined us and our volunteer numbers swelled from over 100 in 2021 to nearly 800.

This speaks to the value volunteering brings to individuals, such as reducing stress, increasing happiness, and helping people find purpose. For Martin, "The teamwork, camaraderie and reward of being part of something that provides for others, particularly children", is what resonates with him about volunteering with Habitat Waterloo Region, while for others like Gunther it is about wanting to give back and utilize his experience to help those that need help.

With such dedication we will continue to build a strong, connected community for families in Waterloo Region.


Partnerships allow us to make a larger, collective impact in our community. For over 20 years, Habitat for Humanity Waterloo Region and Home Hardware Ltd. have come together to help divert waste from our landfills and give back to the community we serve.

Since 1993, the Waterloo ReStore has been open for business within our region. Not long after, Home Hardware Ltd. sponsored one of our Habitat Waterloo Region builds in St. Jacobs. Seeing the mutual benefits of retail partnering, Home Hardware Ltd. started donating to the ReStore in 2016 and has since donated over 137,000 pounds of product.

"ReStores play a large role in Habitat Waterloo Region's fundraising efforts. It's the single largest fundraiser for us," says Rob Snider, Director of ReStore Operations at Habitat Waterloo Region.

Andy Gingerich, Custodial Lead at Home Hardware Ltd. shared in an email, "This is such a valuable partnership for us, as it reduces our waste while also giving back to the community in a tangible way. All product that is sent to Habitat for Humanity (Waterloo Region) is inspected and approved for safety and quality before it is donated. This is a collaborative process between the buyers, the custodians, and the compliance and sustainability team."


